Sociology & Anthropology is thrilled to welcome two new faculty members to the department this fall. Joining us from Northwestern University, Dr. Lynn Gazley is a medical sociologist whose research examines the intersection of the fields of medical sociology, the sociology of science and inequality. Dr. Gazley will teach both sections of SOC 302 Quantitative Research Methods, and SOC372 Global Public Health. We are also pleased to welcome Dr. Miriam Shakow who has a joint appointment with Sociology & Anthropology and History. Dr. Shakow is a sociocultural anthropologist coming to TCNJ from Vanderbilt University. Her research centers on conflicts of class, gender and racial inequalities in Latin America. Dr. Shakow will teach ANT110 Intro to Cultural Anthropology and ANT340 Social Change in Latin America.

An exciting new course this fall is SOC370 Self and Society taught by Dr. Rebecca Li, and held in the Albert C. Wagner Prison in Bordentown, NJ. This course will examine the interactions between self-identity and modern society from both the micro and macro perspective. One half of the students will be accepted from TCNJ, the other half will be inmates at the prison. Some special fall electives are SOC 205 Introduction to Social Work with Antonino Scarpati (also TCNJ's Assistant Dean of Nursing), SOC 310 Urban Youth Deviance with Dr. Thomas Siwatek, SOC385 Intro to Applied Sociology with Dr. Liz Borland, SOC 334 Gender and U.S. Society with Dr. Jodi Brodsky, ANT 371 Culture, Health and Illness with Dr. Rachel Adler, ANT 311 Women and Migration with Tatiana Durbak (human rights lawyer and adjunct professor).

Individual Advising

Students are strongly encouraged to meet with their faculty advisor before registering for classes. Drop by your advisor's office to sign up for an advising appointment time. Sign-up sheets will be posted starting the week of **March 19th** outside your advisor's office. Please be on time for your appointment. If you are unsure who your advisor is, open your student account in PAWS and check the right-hand column under ADVISOR.

Group Advising

A group advising session with Dr. Clydesdale and Program Assistant Kate Koenigsnecht will be held on Wednesday, March 21 in Social Sciences 340 at 12:00pm. We will review general information to help you plan your courses wisely; this meeting complements your individual advising appointment with your faculty advisor, and is especially recommended for students newer to TCNJ.

Academic Holds

If you have an academic hold on your account, you **cannot register** until your advisor lifts the hold, which they can only do after you meet with them. Please be aware that your faculty advisor can only lift an academic hold, and not a health and safety or financial hold.

Preparing for your advising appointment

Before meeting with your advisor, review the [HSS Advising Policy](#) and your advising syllabus to know what is expected of you. For the meeting, print and bring with you the following items:

- A tentative schedule of classes for fall 2012
- Your unofficial transcript from PAWS
- Your academic requirements as listed on PAWS

**Remember that you must meet the following minimum grade requirement in the foundation courses before you may register for department core courses. You may register for core courses if you are currently enrolled in foundation courses, but be advised that your grades will be reviewed before the fall semester and if you do not meet the grade minimums, you will be de-registered from SOC301 or SOC302.
