## **Frequently Asked Questions**

1) **Order of Courses** – If you have not completed the Craft of History, you must enroll in this course this semester. From this point, we recommend that you enroll in the Gateway course followed by the foundation courses. Reading Seminars should be completed one per semester. Ideally, both Reading Seminars should be completed prior to enrolling in the capstone seminar. The capstone should be your final course or one of your final courses.

2) **Number of Courses per Semester** – No more than three history courses should be completed per semester. If you are a double major, plan your course work accordingly. If you are a transfer student, you are only permitted to enroll in three history courses per semester if you have a GPA of 3.3 or higher or by special permission from the Department Chair.

3) **The History Minor Requirements** - Five course units minimum. Three courses must be 300 or 400 level and from three various geographical categories: Africa, America, Asia, Eurasia, Europe, Latin America, or Middle East. No more than one course at the 100-level. The 200 level foundational courses are reserved for History majors, though History minors may enroll if space is available. Occasionally a professor may admit a History minor to a Readings Seminar (HIS 450-464), if space is available.

4) **History Requirements for Education Double Majors** - Education double majors with a second major in History are required to follow the same requirements in History as History Liberal Arts majors, except that you must take at least one course in US History.

5) **Education Course Order for History Secondary Education majors:** EFN 299 and SED 224 must be completed prior to the Junior Field Experience (SPE 323, SED 399, and HED 390); however, we do not recommend that they be completed in the same semester due to the practicum requirements. EFN 299 and EFN 398 can be taken concurrently. EFN 398 does not need to be completed before JFE. JFE is now offered in both Fall and Spring semesters.

6) **Economics Requirement for History Secondary Education Majors** – To fulfill the Economics requirement and a History 300-level course this semester, enroll in HIS365-01 Teaching Economics and Economic History in Spring 2013. If you cannot enroll in this course, you may enroll in ECO 101, ECO 102, or ECO 210 to fulfill the Economics requirement; however, please note the mathematics prerequisite for ECO 101 and 102.

7) **Political Science Requirement for History Secondary Education Majors** - POL 250 is the department's preferred course for History Secondary Education majors to fulfill the political science course requirement. However, if you cannot take POL 250, the following courses taught at TCNJ will act as a replacement for this course:

## **Readings Seminars Descriptions**

### **HIS 450 – Reading Seminar in Modern Asia: Women in Asia - Dr. Jodi Weinstein**

**\*\*Instructor Consent required to register. Please contact the faculty directly to enroll. \*\***

How does Asian history look when we examine it through the lens of gender? Drawing on a variety of materials, this course will explore women's experiences in different historical and socioeconomic settings throughout Asia from 1700 to the present. Readings, discussions, and papers will address the following issues: the impact of Confucianism on gender roles in East Asia; marriage traditions and family life throughout Asia; female rebels, revolutionaries, and political leaders; the challenges of balancing family and career; sexual slavery and prostitution; and women in the developing market economies of East and Southeast Asia.

### **HIS 451 – Reading Seminar in Early Asia: Early Chinese Empire - Dr. Jeff Rice**

A philosophical, intellectual and cultural history of the early Chinese empire, from its unification in the 3rd century BCE until the conquest by the Mongols in the 13th century. Themes covered will be, 1) developments in religions and philosophy, including Confucianism, Buddhism and Daoism; 2) Population growth and migration, the environment and economic development, and material culture; 3) literature and the history of gender in imperial China; and 4) depictions of the heroes from the early Imperial era in later Chinese literature and film and the construction of Chinese culture.

### **HIS 454 - Reading Seminar in Modern Eurasia: Identity, Politics, and Culture in Central Eurasia**

**Dr. Jo-Ann Gross**

**\*\*Instructor Consent required to register. Please contact the faculty directly to enroll. \*\***

The course examines the formation of religious, cultural, political, and national identities in Central Asia from the early modern to the tsarist, Soviet and post-Soviet periods, as expressed through historical, political and cultural studies and primary sources such as documents, historical narratives, Islamic discourse, literature, art and architecture, and material culture. Several themes will be explored: the dual Perso-Islamic sedentary and Turko-Mongolian nomadic heritage; the natural and built environment, Islamic learning and Sufism; art, architectural and artisanal traditions; and national ideology and state-building. Special attention will be paid to the regions of present-day Uzbekistan and Tajikistan. Although the course is open to any student, this seminar is the pre-requisite for the Maymester Silk Road Study-Tour to Uzbekistan and Tajikistan (May 19-June 10, 2013; see: (<http://cge.pages.tcnj.edu/programs/faculty-led-programs/tcnj-silk-road-maymester-2013/>)). Priority will therefore be given to those students who plan to enroll in the Maymester course.

### **HIS 454 – Reading Seminar in Modern Eurasia: Ivan, Peter and Stalin - Dr. Roman Kovalev**

The course will examine three well-known and controversial rulers of Russian and Soviet history: Ivan the Terrible, Peter the Great, and Josef Stalin. Amongst the main questions to be considered in the course will be: were they necessary to the state they ruled and the rest of the world; were they “terrible,” “great,” and tyrannical despots or strong-willed perceptive reformers of their nations; did they make their country stronger or weaker; and, what made them such controversial characters in Russian/Soviet and Western historiography?

### **HIS455 – Reading Seminar in Early Eurasia: Byzantium and the West - Dr. John Karras**

An inquiry into the changing nature of the relationship between the East Roman Empire (Byzantine) and the West Roman Empire. The seminar will investigate developments from the disintegration of Roman Empire, the emergence of Byzantium, episodes of conflict, such as the Crusades to the establishment of a Western ascendancy climaxing with the 4<sup>th</sup> Crusades.

## **Readings Seminars Descriptions - Continued**

### **HIS 458 – Reading Seminar in Modern Latin America: Latin America since 1800 - Dr. Miriam Shakow**

Studying Latin America is essential for understanding the contemporary world, not least to interrogate the common belief in the United States that Latin America is our backyard. In this seminar, we will examine the construction of historical narratives regarding Haiti, Cuba, Argentina, Bolivia, Peru, and the Southern United States. Key themes include the legacies of colonialism, nationalism, development, racial formation, and the relationship between the U.S. and Latin America. Our readings will include historical monographs, fiction, and anthropological works to explore the multiple ways that scholars have traced the past and its effects on contemporary life in Latin America.

### **HIS 460 - Reading Seminar in North American History: American Empire and Its Discontents Dr. Christopher Fisher**

This course examines the rise of US hegemony in the twentieth century and its global responses.

### **HIS 461 – Reading Seminar in Modern Europe: Film & Tyranny: Central Europe – Dr. Cynthia Paces**

***\*\*Instructor Consent required to register. Please contact the faculty directly to enroll. \*\****

***\*\*Second quarter course only\*\****

Despite a century of authoritarian regimes and devastating wars, the twentieth century in Central Europe was marked by innovation in the arts, particularly cinema. Filmmakers subtly depicted conflicts between the state and society, the dynamics of power, and the desire for freedom of expression. This course will examine films of mid-twentieth century Central Europe, focusing on Germany, Czechoslovakia, Poland and Hungary, as a vehicle of exploring the complex history of the region. Topics will include propaganda, fascism and communism, genocide and violence, representing the Holocaust, and explorations of masculinity and femininity.

HIS461-01 and HIS120-01 will be offered in quarter formats with related content. Both would apply towards the Holocaust and Genocide Interdisciplinary Minor. You may consider enrolling in both courses.
