Registration Guide for Spring 2013 Courses

Registration for Spring course starts this year on Tuesday, November 6 through Friday, November 16, 2012. The Department of Sociology and Anthropology looks forward to working with you as you plan your schedule. This document should help you to do so, but it is not a substitute for an advising appointment, so please arrange to meet with your major advisor before registration.

Next semester, we have an array of electives to choose from. If you have not yet taken a course with the newest members of the department, now's your chance! Dr. Lynn Gazley, who joined us from Northwestern University this fall, is a medical sociologist whose research examines the intersection of the fields of medical sociology, the sociology of science and inequality. This spring, she will offer two sections of ANT240, Introduction to Epidemiology. Dr. Miriam Shakow, a sociocultural anthropologist, joined us this fall from Vanderbilt University. Her research centers on conflicts of class, gender and racial inequalities in Latin America. Dr. Shakow will teach two sections of ANT110, Introduction to Cultural Anthropology. You might also want to consider SOC303, Women in World Perspective, taught by Dr. Winnifred Brown-Glaude, who officially joins our department in the Spring as a joint appointment with African-American Studies. Dr. Brown-Glaude, a sociologist who studies race and gender dynamics in the Caribbean, will be strengthening our ties with African-American Studies and helping us to teach and develop curriculum around race, ethnicity, and gender in courses like SOC303, and new ones to come.

Other exciting offerings include SOC336, Social and Cultural Change, taught by Dr. Rebecca Li; SOC345, Inequality, Pollution and the Environment, taught by Dr. Diane Bates; SOC375, Religion and American Culture, taught by Dr. Tim Clydesdale; SOC205, Introduction to Social Work, taught by adjunct Tom Swiatek; and SOC334, Gender in US Society, taught by adjunct Dr. Jodi Brodsky. Those interested in material culture might want to take either section of ANT111, Introduction to Physical Anthropology, taught by Dr. Hillary Del Prete. Finally, Tatiana Durbak, human rights lawyer and adjunct professor, joins us again to bring a hands-on approach to ANT 311, Women and Migration.

Individual Advising

Students are strongly encouraged to meet with their faculty advisor before registering for classes. Drop by your advisor's office to sign up for an advising appointment time. Sign-up sheets will be posted starting the week of **October 22nd** outside your advisor's office. Please be on time for your appointment and review the HSS "Advising Syllabus" you received over email. If you are unsure who your advisor is, open your student account in PAWS and check the right-hand column under ADVISOR.

Group Advising

A group advising session with Department Chair, Dr. Borland, and Program Assistant Karen Dubrule will be held on Thursday, November 1 in Social Sciences 340 at 11:30am. We will review general information to help you plan your courses wisely; this meeting complements your individual advising appointment with your faculty advisor, and is especially recommended for students newer to TCNJ.

Peer Mentoring

The Department's Peer Mentor is Nicole Matyas, a senior major who can help students as they think through their schedules, as well as with things like planning for internships, study abroad, time management, etc. Nicole has "office hours" in the Social Sciences Atrium from 1130-130 every Tuesday.

Academic Holds

If you have an academic hold on your account, you **cannot register** until your advisor lifts the hold, which they can only do after you meet with them. Please be aware that your faculty advisor can only lift an academic hold, and not a health and safety or financial hold.

Preparing for your advising appointment

Before meeting with your advisor, review the [HSS Advising Policy](#) and your advising syllabus to know what is expected of you. For the meeting, print and bring with you the following items:

- A tentative schedule of classes for Spring 2013
- Your unofficial transcript from PAWS
- Your academic requirements as listed on PAWS

****Remember that you must meet the following minimum grade requirement in the foundation courses before you may register for department core courses. You may register for core courses if you are currently enrolled in foundation courses, but be advised that your grades will be reviewed before the fall semester and if you do not meet the grade minimums, you will be de-registered from SOC301 or SOC302.**
